Background

The last extant Baptist church in Allston-Brighton, the Hill Memorial Baptist Church was constructed in 1903 on N Harvard Street, a major thoroughfare in Allston. The land the church sits upon was donated by George A. Hill and his sister Georgia A. Hill, on the condition that the chapel built there be named after their father, Deacon Samuel Hill. The Hills had owned and farmed this large tract of land since the mid-1870s. The unique architecture of the church, the unusual presence of the tapered buttresses that appear at each corner, were more typically observed in masonry Gothic Revival churches. The pointed arch stained glass windows of the upper walls of the north and south transepts are also noteworthy details. The Allston Brighton CDC purchased the church in 2023, with plans to preserve the building and adapt it for community use in the future.
